They are 88 children residing at the Village and 105 in our Community Orphan Care Programme (COCP). We are still surviving despite the economic hardships we are facing. Our oldest child, Nyarai Moyo, is going back to university for her final semester. We continue praying for her success.

Our orchard is doing well. It was dedicated on the 12th of July 2009. We have currently planted one and half acres of our three acre garden.
